Oxford: student city

We know that choosing where to go to university is a big decision and that not all students want the same thing. Luckily, Oxford has something for everyone.

1. Oxford Brookes University, Headington Campus

Located in Headington, a leafy residential suburb, our main campus is walking distance from parks and a short bus ride from the city centre and the Cowley Road.

2. South Park

Two minutes walk from our Headington Campus, this green space offers some of the best views of Oxford's beautiful skyline.

3. Cowley Road

A vibrant area with places to eat from all corners of the globe. With pubs, bars and cafes, it's a firm favourite with students.

4. O2 Academy Oxford

This Cowley Road music venue hosts headline acts, as well as club nights. Brookes Sport student nights take place here every Wednesday during semester time.

5. The Ultimate Picture Palace

Offering student discounts, this is Oxford's first independent cinema, showing everything from the latest blockbusters, to foreign language films and the classics.

6. Punting down the River Cherwell

A quintessentially Oxford experience, punting is a unique way to see the city from the river.

7. Oxford Botanic Gardens

With free entry for Oxford Brookes students, you can explore Britain's oldest botanic garden that has over 6,000 different plant species!

8. Queen's Lane Coffee House

A great place to grab a coffee or slice of cake. Opened in 1654, it's reputed to be the oldest continually working coffee house in the whole of Europe.

12. Natural History Museum and Pitt Rivers Museum


From dinosaur skeletons to shrunken heads – these museums are free to enter and hold more than 5 million specimens!



CHOOSING MODULES FOR YOUR COURSE

- Our courses are broken down into equal-sized study units known as modules. Each module consists of teaching support, private study and assessment.
- You will normally select four single modules per semester or equivalent. Double modules can also be taken; however some can last a full academic year, so these are not available if you are only studying for one semester.
- A Language module can be added to your programme as a 5th module. There will be no additional charge for this module for Study Abroad (fee-paying) students.
- Formal teaching is usually around 3 hours a week in subjects like humanities and social sciences, and 6 hours a week in science and technology and some vocational subjects.
- Generally teaching takes place during the first 12 weeks. For the rest of the semester you will complete all the relevant assessments; this can include coursework or examinations.
- There are two semesters per academic year.
- The first semester is from September to December. The second semester is from January to May

English Language courses

You can take our University English (pre-sessional) course before, or as part of, a study abroad programme.

This course will improve your English language skills for any of our courses. It will familiarise you with university life, our study facilities and teaching methods before starting your main programme.

The course includes:

- academic reading
- academic writing
- · academic listening and speaking
- study and research skills

The use of authentic materials in the classroom will develop your knowledge and understanding of studying at university level and also of British life and culture.

We offer 6 or 12 week courses. Please contact the study abroad and exchanges team if you would like advice on the most suitable course length for you.

There may be an additional charge for University English courses. See page 15.



Living in Oxford

The amount of money you will need for living costs will depend on your course and individual level of spending. The UK Visas and Immigration service recommends you have at least $\mathfrak{L}1,015$ per month for living costs when studying outside of London. Living costs will vary significantly from student to student, so you should think realistically about what you spend.

How to apply

We welcome applicants from all countries with a wide range of international qualifications. We are happy to look into all applications on an individual basis, because if you are interested in coming then we are interested in finding out about you. We are here to make sure your studies get off to the right start.

APPLICATION DEADLINES

For Semester 1

For Semester 2 (January – May): 15 October

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

To apply for our exchange and study abroad programmes you will need to meet our academic, and English language requirements (if English is not your first language).

Academic requirements

You should have completed at least one year of university studies, have a good academic record and a GPA of 2.8 (on a 4.0 scale) or equivalent.

English language requirements

If you are not a native speaker of English, please ensure that you meet our English language requirements of IELTS 6.0 (with 6.0 in reading and writing and 5.5 in listening and speaking) or equivalent.

If you do not meet our English language requirements we offer a pre-sessional University English course (see page 11), which will help you reach the required level.

APPLICATION PROCESS

You will need to provide the following supporting documents:

- a copy of your passport
- evidence of your English language qualifications (if English is not your first language)
- an academic transcript and an official translation (if this is not in English) which shows evidence of your background in the chosen subject(s).

If you are an exchange student, you should contact the International Office in your home university for application information and a list of required supporting documents.

APPLY FOR YOUR VISA

Immigration advice in the UK is regulated and the International Student Advice Team (ISAT) are the University's designated immigration advisers.

If your nationality is not British (or you are not from the United Kingdom), you will need a visa to come to the UK and study a course. Please check whether you need a visa or not, please visit:

Most students will need to apply for a student visa or a Visitor visa if your course is less than 6 months.

EXCHANGE PROGRAMME

If you are studying at one of our partner universities you can come to Oxford Brookes as an exchange student.

We have exchange agreements with around 150 institutions worldwide.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS FOR VISAS

If you need a student visa there's a range of qualifications we can accept as evidence of your English language level. If you are from a country that the UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) considers to be majority English speaking, then you will not have to prove your English language level for visa purposes.

If you are applying for our University English courses you must take a UKVI approved SELT test.
