Small vs. Large Classrooms: Each Has Its Perks!


Smaller classes mean deep discussions and closer connections, while larger ones are perfect for big ideas and lively lectures.

To avoid the classic first-day panic, Ayesha explored campus ahead of time. By Day 1, she was breezing through hallways like a seasoned pro!






Not just about books! Ayesha got the inside scoop on what professors expect: critical thinking, teamwork, and the Canadian grading system. No more guessing games!

Mastering E-Class Navigation


Ayesha quickly learned her way around the online platform, where she finds assignments, announcements, and all things class-related in one spot!

Understanding York U's grading scale helps Ayesha set realistic goals and know what's expected to succeed in each course.




Make a Great Impression

High School vs. University


Group work at York isn't just 'divide and conquer' like in high school. It's about truly working together and blending different strengths

Respect the Original Ideas


Ayesha realized that citing shows appreciation for the authors' hard work. It's all about giving credit where it's due!






